After the New Year, on January 12, Guest Conductor Kayoko Dan will lead the orchestra on a compelling musical journey. The program titled Unity: A Musical Journey includes Valerie Coleman's Umoja: Anthem of Unity, a vibrant celebration of togetherness. Christopher Theofanidis's Rainbow Body will transport listeners through ethereal textures. The concert wraps up with Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 5, which is a monumental work. The New Year continues on February 16, with Guest Conductor Daniel Wiley leading us through tales of love gone awry with Coleridge-Taylor's Petite Suite de Concert and Tchaikovsky's Romeo and Juliet. Shostakovich Symphony No. 5 expresses the political adversity of a composer deemed a "barbarian artist" by the Soviet regime.

In the Spring, the final two concerts of the season are sure to please. On <u>March 2</u>, Guest Conductor <u>Michael Stanley</u> illustrates the influence of folk music with a concert titled <u>Folk Music of the Americas</u>. Inspired by American folk music, <u>Copland</u> wrote *Appalachian Spring*; <u>Márquez</u> drew from the dance music of Mexico in *Danzon No. 2* and <u>Dvořák</u> took inspiration from spirituals and Native American music for his *New World Symphony*. On <u>April 6</u>, the season wraps up with <u>Nostalgia: Connecting With Our Past and Future</u>. Guest Conductor <u>Alex Amsel</u> will lead us on a

musical journey to discover what 21st Century Argentinian composer Benzecry's *Obertura Tanguera* has in common with **Brahms'** 19th Century *Symphony No. 1* and **Strass's** 20th Century *Der Rosenkavalier*.
